1.1 INTRODUCTION

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

2.2.1: The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners.

Students Aspiring for admission in the institute are directed and advised to apply online through the admission portal of institutional website; all the required information is available there. The aspirants need to register themselves by filling online application form. The registration fees are also collected online. Merit wise shortlisted applicants are called for counselling on schedule date declared in advance by Higher Education Department of Chhattisgarh. After counselling these applicants are directed to deposit fee through online mode.

The entire system of admission is on-line. The students apply on-line application indicating the choice of the course and the college they wish to seek admission. The admission is given to students of regular courses after counselling and getting the feedback for their options. Students have freedom to choose their options and change accordingly during counselling. The admission for the regular courses is given on merit basis decided by the Department of Higher Education of Chhattisgarh. The entire admission process is done according with the governments reservation policy.

To enhance the academic performance of students from classroom lecture, Chalk and talk, laboratory practical, CCE class, seminars. This helps in assessing the number of advanced learners and slow learners amongst the others.

Slow Learners:

Special attention is given to the students who are identified as the weaker students. Doubts and personal difficulties regarding the subject are solved in the classes in the start of the session fundamentals are taught for the better understanding of the subject. Sometimes the students are encouraged to do board work before the class so that their level of comprehension could be increased and teachers could rectify their problems.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode

Response:

2.5.1: Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode.

Evaluation is an integral part of teaching learning process. With regular interaction of IQAC, examination committee plan and workout for reforms in evaluation system. The college adjust academic calendar by including internal assessment, short term courses and the University examination. The institutional eternal evolution system is the decentralised in order to make it more transparent and objective.

The college manages all the mode of examination arranged by The Sant Gahira Guru University Sarguja Ambikapur (assignment, projects) before annual examination. The doubt and enquiries or the students regarding the pattern of optimal answers are clarified by the teacher of concern subjects. With the commencement of the new session Class- tests are scheduled to be held for the students. The schedule of Class-Test continues till the end of the session; the students are provided with the correct answer scripts of the Class-Tests so that they can be aware of their mistakes. If the students Express, the difficulties in understanding the questions which were set in test the questions and the topic on which such questions were set are discussed in the lecture hour by the faculty member The students are often suggested to write the answers again as home assignments incorporating the modification and changes made by the examiners in the test scripts. If there is any tabulation related error in the assessment, in all examination arranged by the college prior to first second and third part examinations. the students are provided with the corrected answer-scripts by the relevant faculty members.

Unit test/tutorials are conducted periodically. The assessment work is carried out by the concerned subject faculty in the institution. The evaluation reports are prepared within the stipulated time and communicated to the students in the classroom as well as displayed on the notice board. The answer books are shown on the demand of the students and guided them for their better performance in the forthcoming examination of the university.

2.5.2: Mechanism to deal with internal examination related grievances is transparent, time- bound and efficient.

The Examination pattern in the college is of one fold.

Main examination

1- The faculty members provide the corrected answer script of the students. The doubt and queries of the students regarding the pattern of optimal answers are clarified by the faculty examiners. If there is any tabulation related error in the assessment, corrections are duly made by the examiner and the corrected marks are officially posted against the name of the concerned student. The Parents Teacher Meeting is a regular phenomenon for students. Such meetings are held after the publication of results of the class test. If there is a marked discrepancy between class performance in class test that the teachers are wholeheartedly provide counselling to the students with a broader understanding of the subject of their Study topics already taught in the class are discussed again, students are given time bound home assignments to be checked by the faculty members and more books and general are suggested to the student's (for reading and so on). However, the cause may be extra academic too.

2-The college addresses the grievance of students regarding main examination, if there are any by writing to the affiliated University to the best of their satisfaction.

3- IQAC consistently work on the student centric activities. It interacts with the exam committee and the students the academic calendar is displayed on the college notice board. In introduction program principal brief about the examination evaluation system and how the COs POs and PSOs can be attained The college conducts tutorial, home assignment tests presentations, group discussions to assess the performance of students. The college exam committee executes its internal exams in a very meticulous manner.

4- All examination related grievances address to the committee where principle is the chairperson, internal supervisors and internal flying squad is deputed for smooth conduction of the exams. If any grievance occurs, he/ she needs to apply to the exam committee. At initial level committee discusses with the concern teacher and solves issue at this primary level. Internal exam marks of the students are displayed on the notice board and queries are discussed with them till they satisfy. Generally, there is a zero tolerance policy for the malpractices conducted by the students. Since it is an internal evaluation students cooperate in a very positive manner and up to this stage, no such serious grievances raised in the college. The institutional reforms in continuous evaluation system are related to create interest for the study and to make the students

The Govt. Naveen College Janakpur is located in village post janakpur distt. – korea (C.G.) . The college is spread over an area of 6070.28sq.m. The institute has a well-organized, magnificent building symbolizing grandeur of the institute. This building covers a total area of 1652.4 sq. m. It is a double storied planned structure. There are 10 classrooms and 05 laboratories in our college. The other amenities comprise of Central library, playground (proposed), Girls' Common Room, Cycle Stand, N.S.S. Room and Student Activity Room, staff room. The ground floor comprises principal's office, account section examination control room and computer lab.

Learning Facility

The college has small but sufficient equipped laboratories and classrooms and library with more 7500 books and bound periodicals. Classrooms (total 10) of different capacities meet requirements of UG students. Big classrooms are available for 80-100 UG (BA) students. Each classroom has comfortable furniture and adequate lighting. One classroom is equipped with LCD projectors and Wi-Fi. One common seminar room is existing on the side of library. The academic programme of the college for since is run by good laboratory experience. To engage students with a variety of practical orientation, self-instructional, learner friendly modes, there are 05 laboratories. The library is separate on the roof of building. It has a small reading room used for reading and some time it is used for seminars, One staff room for the 12 faculty members. These spaces enable good effective student teacher interaction. Faculty rooms have appropriate furniture and storage facilities. One small Girl common room is existing where girls are read and sit for various purposes. In the beginning of session, principal, the head of the Institution, addresses to all the teacher and supporting staff and share suggestions. Janbhagidari meeting is also conducted for improvement of existing premises and enhancement of the infrastructure of college. College development committee is formed for the improvement of facility provided to the students.

In spite of limited infrastructure, college always attempts to ensure the necessary for the students. The following facilities are provided to the students:

1. Provides Green board for teaching purpose.
2. Appoint the guest lecturer, Janbhagidari teachers for teaching.
3. Departments organize seminars and webinars to improve the learning ability of the student.
4. Teaching through LCD projector, Computer based lecture, quiz competition, doubt classes are organized by the institution which is effective method for innovative teaching.

Our college has no gymnasium and yoga center.

Sports and Games

The institute has developed the facility for sports and games for conduction of games the college Institute has employed a well-qualified sports teacher, who supervises students to actively participate in various sports competitions. Sports teacher trains the students in their chosen games in the time-slot allocated to them in the timetable. The institute has a spacious and well equipped indoor-sports room, where students can play games like chess and carrom board. An open play ground is provided for the students to play outdoor games such as badminton, kabaddi, khokho, high jump, low jumps throws ball and cricket. The institution encourages students to participate in inter-college, university-level, and state-level competitions. The institution organizes intra-college sports competition every year during annual cultural meet.

Cultural Activities

The college cultural committee hosts different cultural event during the academic session, NSS wings also actively organize different cultural based event during the camp and the historical days. Students joined in these wings as per their interest. The students are encouraged to actively participate and showcase their talent and skills. The activities contribute to bring out latent talent among students, which helps to build their overall personality by developing communication skills, leadership skills and team working skills. Students get to showcase their talents during competitions organized in annual cultural fest. Most of students of our college are from rural and very low economic background thus the college library plays a central role in providing books for learning. 99% of students regularly use book issuing and reading room facility. The average usage of library varies from 60- 70 visitors per day. A time table is designed to facilitate smooth issuing of books for every class in a week.

The records of issued and returned books are manually maintained in issuing register. In the beginning of session, the library management committee invites list of books and journals from each department which are then passed for purchasing as per grant received under various heads like BPL/SC/ST/ reference and magazine. The Library is not partially automated with software presently, but we have trying to fill up in this field soon. The college orders the ILMS software for college named.

The office then sanction budget based on these data for the purchase of books every year to the college. After then the Librarian asks for the list of requirement of text and reference books from each department. based on the requirement, quotation is called from various publications and the books are purchased from the firm having the minimum cost and fulfilling the needs of the college.

Maintain of College Building:

- Building construction and maintenance Committee has been constituted in the college under the

supervision of the Principal to look after the maintenance of buildings and other infrastructure facilities.

- Being a government college, the maintenance of infrastructure and electric fitting is done by the CG Public Works Department (PWD).
- The maintenance and new construction proposals are forwarded to the PWD for the preparation of detailed estimate. After receiving detailed estimate, it is forwarded to the Department of Higher Education for funding and execution. Construction proposals for cycle stand and guard quarter was also executed through the PWD in same manner.
- Minor maintenance works are done with funds from the Jan Bhagidari Samiti.
- The college has appointed part time sweeper for maintaining cleanliness and dusting to the college premises including classes, laboratories, library, toilets NSS/YRC room, etc.
- The college has a regular watchman (post was not sanctioned) to ensure security of the campus. he is also designated work of gardener during day time.

Maintenance of class rooms:

There are exclusively 10 class rooms, in them classes are held from 10:40 am to 4:20 pm. Regular cleanliness is done by sweeper. The students are motivated to throw refuses in dustbins and keep their classes clean for which the college initiated **Best Class Competition** to inculcate habit of cleanliness in them. All the maintenance and repair works of building was done by PWD of Chattisgarh Govt.

Maintenance of Laboratories:

There are 5 laboratories which are equipped with the basic equipment facilities. The laboratory Equipment's are maintained by the lab technician/ lab attendant of the department. The students perform various experiments everyday under the supervision of concerning faculty.

Maintenance of IT Facility:

The computers and their accessories are maintained by the supplier during the warranty period. Routine Maintenance is done by the concerning office staff.

Maintenance of Sports facility:

Facilities for Chess, Carrom, Badminton and Volleyball are available in sports room and open courtyard from 3:00-5:00 pm after proper entry in register.

Maintenance of Library facility:

The Library is comprised of issuing section and reading room facility. Librarian ensures the maintenance and functioning of library services through support of book lifter and peon. Day-to-day monitoring is also done by the principal and these senior faculty members who also take regular feedback from the students to assess the situation and take action whenever necessary.

IQAC takes review of the status of the teacher's research work and performance such as book chapter, research paper, research guidance seminars, webinars, FDP and orientation and refreshes and other administrative training programs, NACC FDP etc. The teachers of this colleges are well qualified some of them are having Ph.D degrees and some of them don't. Those who do not have Ph.D they are pursuing their research work.

There is a temple of Goddesses **Chang Mata** from 6 km to Janakpur which is a centre of faith for the nearest villagers. Janakpur is about 156 km far from the district headquarters that is Korea, while 260 km far from the affiliated Sant Gahira Guru University Ambikapur. Because of the distance of district headquarter, lead college as well as the affiliated university to faces deep inconvenience because of highly charged fare for conveyance.

About 60% of students of the total strength did not see the trains and it is far way to ride over and even they did not go to the district headquarters like cities the major portion of Janakpur area is having the lack of mobile network connectivity.
